Learning outcomes:	During this class, students will be exposed to the vision of anti-racist social justice education that is both practical for teachers and sharp in analysis. Students will know the definitions of multicultural education, global education, diversity education, and cultural pluralism. Multicultural education is understood as a struggle for social justice that recognises the need to fight against systematic

	racism, colonisation and cultural oppression that takes place in schools in the USA and different countries in Europe. This class invites students to engage in natural social and political issues. Students will explore how social, economic and cultural institutions contribute to inequality. Exploration includes understanding the relationships between teaching, culture and privilege and recognising the historical and institutional inequalities we see today.
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
